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## PREFACE

*Communications have always been an important factor in war - sometimes the decisive one. When the great potential of mobility can be exploited by optimum communications, the products are those which commanders through the ages have always sought - flexibility, economy of force, surprise, and the ability to concentrate, deploy, regroup or disperse rapidly.*

*In Vietnam, probably for the first time in history, communications were able to match in dimension and efficiency the great advances in mobility. The helicopter, allied with the more traditional means of tracked vehicles, aircraft, small ships and boats, made possible the application of concepts which were not new in principle but which previously could never be more than partially implemented. These concepts extended into every field of activity - tactical, logistic and administrative. But primarily they depended for their success on communications, because without them the many complex activities which had to proceed simultaneously and in co-ordination could not have been controlled. Command in any military sphere does not automatically confer the ability to control; communications alone can confer that.*

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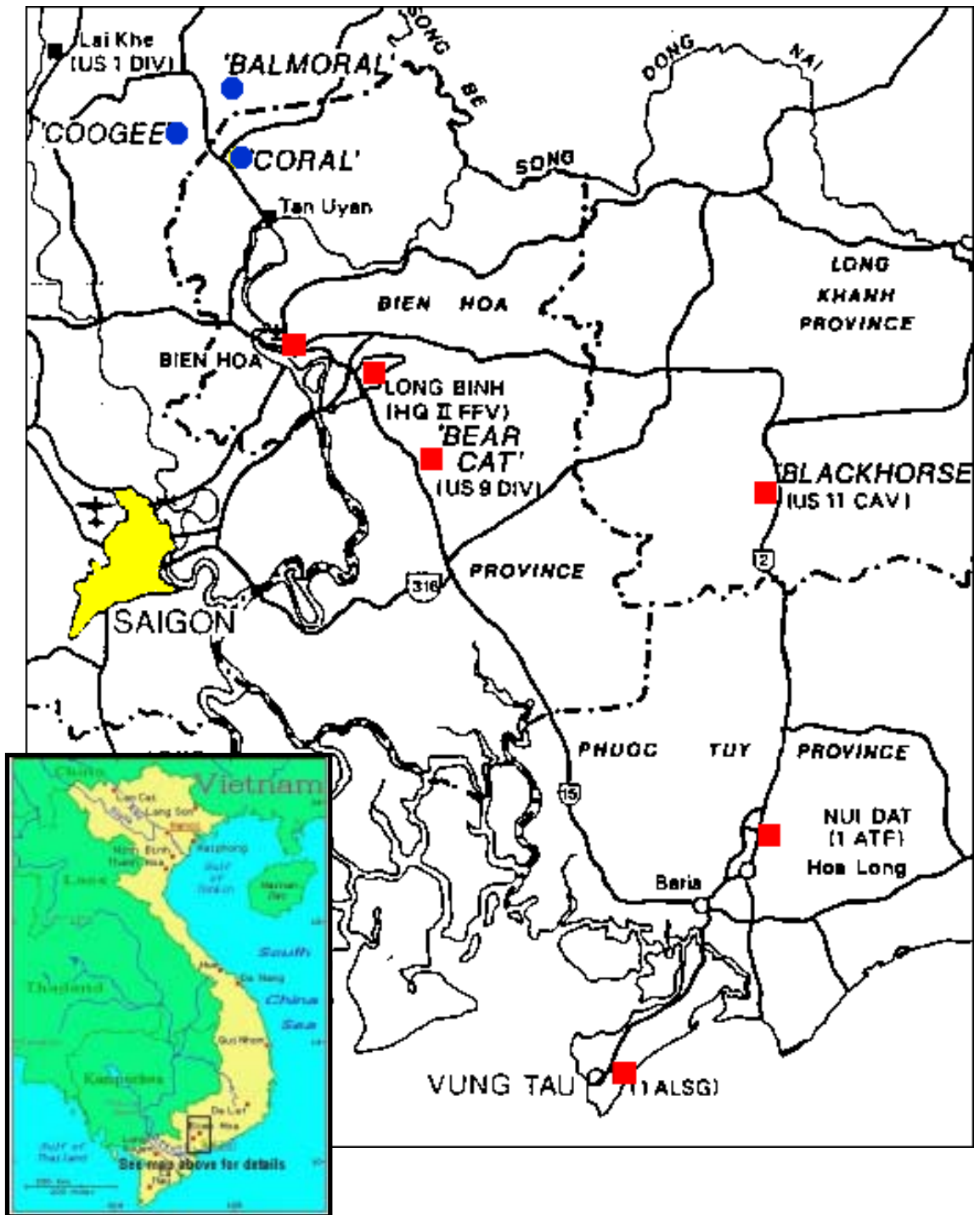


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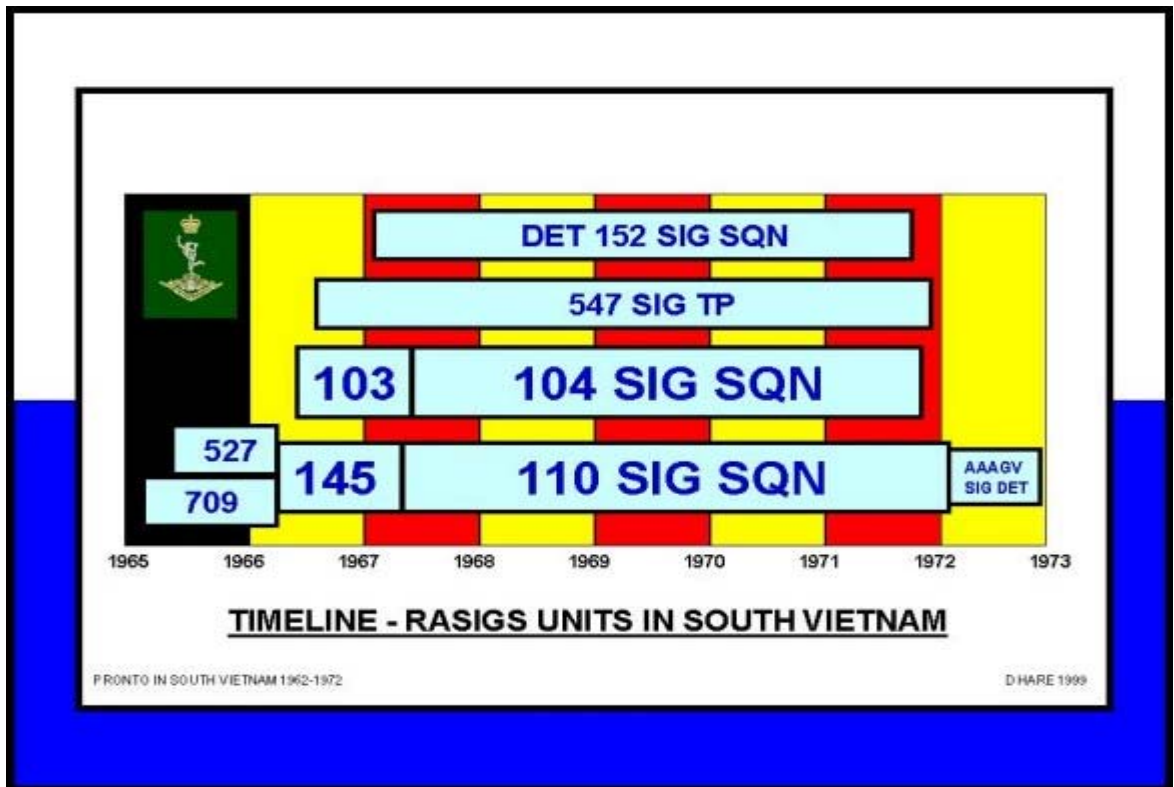


### 1 ATF AREA OF OPERATIONS (MAP)
